

DIMITRIE CANTEMIR (1673-1723) was the first Romanian cultural figure with a broad European profile. A hostage to the Turkish court in Istanbul, Cantemir was later on crowned as a king of Moldova but, subsequently to his rebellion, he was deposed and ended in Russia as a refugee and protégé at the court of Peter the Great. He possessed the encyclopaedic mind of a humanist historian, philosopher, writer, musicologist, anthropologist and geographer. Cantemir wrote in Romanian, French, Latin, Turkish and Russian. The Divan or The Quarrel between the Wise and the World (1697-1698) is practically an anthology or digest (the first of this kind in Romanian literature), a kind of literary thesaurus comprising religious and secular texts of oriental and occidental, ancient and medieval provenance. Cantemir was concerned with the introduction of the late medieval model of knowledge into Romanian culture, and he published in 1705 a compilation of logic, the Little Compendium of General Logic. Written between 1714-1715, his Descriptio Moldaviae (The Description of Moldavia) is an ample, encyclopaedic work focusing on his kingdom from a historical, geographic, linguistic and ethnologic standpoint. He analyses the origins of his people, the politics of the time, the ceremonies and customs, the laws and the economy of the country. Religion, education and language are treated with acute perception and great literary abilities. Cantemir's European reputation is due to his Incrementa atque Decrementa Aulae Othomanicae (The Growth and Decay of the Ottoman Empire), one of the pioneering, seminal studies of the Ottoman Empire that intertwines a historical and anthropological approach. He was the very first European to investigate and theorise on oriental music, and his knowledge of Islam theology and ottoman customs made him an authority for other researchers.

The Hieroglyphic History was written in Romanian between 1703-1705. It is apparently a hermetic writing, presenting the agitated events of king Cantemir's own time in an allegorical way. The fighting aristocratic factions and the influence exerted by the two great powers, Russia and the Ottoman Empire, are depicted in a vivid (very personal and passionate) fashion, employing birds and animals as protagonists of the story. The book is a political manual and a philosophical essay at the same time, a reflection aiming to identify the forces behind historical movements.
