Appropriately we return to Ermington for this performance – an event which involves and invites the community, young and old alike, to celebrate Ben's art.

International Conference and Showcase

Alarmingly an increasing number of young people in Europe leave school prematurely without the skills required to fully integrate in the knowledge society and labour market. They face the risk of social exclusion.

The Interdisciplinary Centre for Computer Music Research (ICCMR) and Centre for Humanities, Music and Performing Arts Research (HuMPA) have teamed up with a number of European partners to tackle this problem through the E-Motion Project, which investigates the use of computer music technologies to aid and motivate youngsters.

The conference reports on the outcomes of the study and includes an evening concert with music produced by pupils from schools in Liverpool, Bucharest and Rome.



Cinema has been dominated by the United States since its invention, and in this series a number of prominent academics will explore the work and impact of an eclectic range of directors who bring something uniquely American to their work. Scorsese. Spielberg, Peckinpah, Kubrick and Altman are all "American mavericks" and this is epitomised in the ways in which they challenge filmic conventions. They have made films which manage to remain personal and innovative despite often having to work within a creatively restrictive studio system. The lectures run in parallel with screenings of a noteworthy work by each director.



Simon Topping, University of Plymouth American Mavericks

Simon Topping is a lecturer in American History at the University of Plymouth. While his expertise lies in the area of the early civil rights movement, notably Lincoln's Lost Legacy: The Republican Party and the African American Vote, 1928-1952 (2008), he has taught modules on American film and mass culture at the university for many years, examining popular culture within its historical context. His lecture will contextualise Taxi Driver in the aftermath of the Vietnam War and the Watergate scandal as the United States moved uneasily towards its bicentennial.

## Plymouth During the English Civil War

Professor Mark Stoyle, University of Southampton History Series

Mark Stoyle specialises in early modern British history, with particular research interests in the 'British crisis' of the 1640s; cultural, ethnic and religious identity in Wales and Cornwall between 1450 and 1700; and popular memory of the English Civil War from 1660 to the present day. His books include West Britons: Cornish Identities and the Early Modern British State (Exeter: Exeter University Press, 2002) and Loyalty and Locality: Popular Allegiance in Devon during the English Civil War (Exeter University Press, 1994).

The lecture explores the impact of the English Civil War and the subsequent siege on Plymouth.



# Untitled Actuation, 2010

Paul Hurley is a performance artist who has shown work in galleries, theatres and public spaces internationally. For his performance in Plymouth, he will make a new 'actuation' as part of a series he has been making since 2008. Whilst harking back to classic 1960s and 1970s performance/ action art - using buckets, mess, ritual and endurance these performances simultaneously deviate from them, and are a little more playful and queer, certainly. Hurley's work combines strong simple images, intense physical actions and a rare humour that promises to please as well as bemuse.

## American Directors, American Crime

08 November - 06 December

To accompany the American Mavericks lecture series we have developed a programme exploring the ways in which directors, Scorsese, Spielberg, Peckinpah. Kubrick and Altman have approached and depicted elements of crime in their films

From alienation and paranoia on the crime ridden streets of 1970s New York City in Scorsese's seminal Taxi Driver. to Sam Peckinpah's bittersweet re-telling of old friends, turned enemies in the violent, yet intimate Pat Garrett & Billy the Kid. This is also a rare opportunity to see the exciting cinematic debuts of Spielberg and Kubrick once again on the big screen. The series concludes with Altman's brilliant critique of noir mythology in his adaptation of Raymond Chandler's The Long Goodbye.

Although his attraction to political activist Betsy (Shepherd) hints at a normal life. Bickle's disdain for the city and its spawn overwhelms him.

Add the grit of Schrader's bitter experience to the burgeoning talent of Martin Scorsese and the amazing power and otherness of Robert De Niro and you're some way towards understanding why, 30 years on from its original release, critics and audiences continue to hail Taxi Driver.

## The Soviet Union's Challenge to British India between the World Wars

Dr Alastair Kocho-Williams, University of the West of England History Series

The lecture focuses on Dr Kocho-Williams' current research, including the use of archival records in Moscow. Senior Lecturer in International and Soviet History he specialises in research into the conduct and institutions of Russian and Soviet foreign relations during the 20th Century.

James Onley, Senior Lecturer in Middle Eastern History, specialises in Gulf history, Indian history, and British imperial history. He is the author of *The Arabian Frontier of the British Raj: Merchants, Rulers, and the British in the Nineteenth Century Gulf*, (Oxford University Press, 2007). His forthcoming book, *Protecting Arabia: Britain and the Gulf Shaikhs*, 1820–1971, is a reinterpretation of Britain's role in the Gulf. It explains how regional alliances, tribal allegiances, and tribute relations worked, offering new insights into the role played by outside powers.

Constantin Silvestri (1913 – 1969), conductor, composer and pianist was born in Bucharest. In 1961 he was appointed principal conductor of the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra. His last three consecutive concerts were in Plymouth, Bournemouth and Exeter before his death aged 55.

Pianist Anda Anastasescu has performed extensively with orchestras in Europe, USA and Asia, and toured with her own orchestra, The London Schubert Players. She has appeared in prestigious festivals and concert halls and broadcast for the BBC. French National Radio and Romanian National Radio and TV.

Doina Rotaru is Professor of Composition at the University of Music, Bucharest. She has written over 100 works that cover most musical genres: from solo, chamber, choral to orchestral works, from works that mix instrumental with electronic music to theatre music.

Umbre (1999) endeavours to associate - and dissociate - several meanings of shadow, a very old symbol in all traditional cultures. In this music, the shadow becomes "echo", "pedal" - a continual evolution between "light" and "dark".

Paul Williams lectures in 20th-century literature. He has published on the relationship between film, popular culture and literature and the Cold War. He is currently finishing a book for Liverpool University Press entitled Race, Ethnicity and Nuclear War, and is the co-editor of The Rise of the American Comics Artist, forthcoming from the University Press of Mississippi. He will discuss how Kubrick's Dr Strangelove fashioned a satire of American militarism whose absurd humour set it outside the other nuclear war films of the era. That individual vision has been key to the film's ongoing appreciation by fans, critics and directors alike.



Dr John Sealey, Associate Lecturer, University of Plymouth American Mavericks

John Sealey has been a film practitioner for 20 years. His practice is grounded in cultural identity and his films interrogate areas of research within Diaspora histories; their function, to challenge and create new ways of reception within the formulaic structure of classical narrative cinema. By analysing, for example, unusual camera perspectives and referencing and dismantling classical Hollywood styles, John will demonstrate how The Long Goodbye validates Altman's status as a mayerick.

Marlowe attempts to protect a friend suspected of battering his wife to death, and gets up to his neck in blackmail, suicide, betrayal and murder, Altman constructs not only a comment on the changes in values in America over the last three decades, but a critique of film noir mythology: references, both ironic and affectionate, to Chandler (cats and alcoholism) and to earlier private-eye thrillers abound.

Shot in gloriously steely colours with a continually moving camera, wondrously scripted and superbly acted all round, it's one of the finest movies of the '70s.




